Officials sworn by county attorney

Jack Willey will preside over Jackson County Board of Supervisors meetings this year.

The Maquoketa Republican and District 2 representative, who is starting his 19th year on the board, was unanimously elected chairman at the supervisors' annual organizational meeting Friday afternoon, Jan. 2.

The board departed from its regular Tuesday morning meeting schedule to hold the annual post-New Year's Day session.

Willey replaces District 1 Supervisors Larry "Buck" Koos of LaMotte, who had held the chairman post the past two years.

District 3 Supervisor Steve Flynn of rural Maquoketa was unanimously elected vice chairman, succeeding Willey.

County Attorney Chris Raker also con-

ducted swearing-in ceremonies, administering the oath of office to Koos, county Auditor M. Joell Deppe and Sheriff Russ Kettmann, all of whom were re-elected to their respective jobs in last November's general election.

Each also signed affidavits.

Koos and Deppe begin their second four-year terms while Kettmann is starting his fourth term. All are Democrats.

Koos recognized his wife, Sandy, his daughter, Nicole, and his son, Steven, who attended the brief swearing-in ceremony. He thanked his family for their support during the election campaign. A second daughter, Danielle, was unable to attend.
