City leaders receive pay increases

Maquoketa's three top department heads will to \$57,183. receive 3.75 percent pay increases starting in July, the Maquoketa City Council agreed this

The raises were among several actions taken this week by the council.

The council approved without discussion a recommendation of the council's Personnel Committee to grant pay increases to city employees who are not members of a bargaining unit.

The 3.75 percent raises are the same percentage amount agreed on earlier to the city's unionized employees. The raises will take effect with the start of the city's fiscal year on July 1.

The raises will increase the salaries of:

- City Manager Brian Wagner from his current pay of \$89,571 to \$92,930.
- Public Works Director David Popp from

- Police Chief Brad Koranda from \$55,116 tree services that offered bids for all 10 trees.
- Assistant Police Chief Craig Jackson from \$49,837 to \$51,706.
- Police Sgts. Robert Simonson and Kennie Sparks from \$45,684 to \$47,398.

Also given 3.75 percent raises starting July 1 were Judy Carr, deputy city clerk; Diane Frandsen, city finance director, and City Hall staff members Sue Ellison and Sarah Johnston and Karen Rubel, director of the city's local-access cable television channels.

The council also increased by \$5 the limit city employees pay for group health insurance coverage. The cap applies to both single and family

In other business, the council awarded a \$5,300 contract to Gil's Tree Service of Maquo keta to cut down 10 trees on city rights-of-way. The business was the lowest bidder among four

Five of the trees are on South Niagara Street, three are on East Maple Street, and one each are on North Main and East Pleasant streets.

The council awarded another contract to Gil's Tree Service, for \$1,500, to trim 15 trees in First Ward Park.

The council also awarded a \$1,900 contract to Davey Tree Expert Co. of Bettendorf to trim and install cables to give extended life to two large sugar maple trees in First Ward Park.

Council member Marsha Myers asked why the city "would put this much into saving two trees?"

Popp explained that the trees weren't trimmed properly when they were smaller, and have grown up with major limbs that are split in a "Y" pattern.
