

Grants aid Eagle Scouts with projects

As a part of its grant-making efforts, the Maquoketa Area Community Foundation has assisted two local Eagle Scouts with recent projects that benefited the Jackson County Conservation office.

Tyler Polk's project added a roof and bench to make the viewing deck more attractive to nature lovers who will now have a place to sit and take shelter from the sun.

The existing wooden duck nesting boxes in the Hurstville Interpretive Center's wetland were destroyed with the 2008 floods. These boxes had provided wood ducks with a safe place to nest and hatch their spring ducklings. Andrew Johnson oversaw the recreation of these boxes, once again providing a safe nesting place for these wood ducks, which can be viewed from the improved viewing deck.

The MACF provides grants to non-profit organizations that serve the greater Jackson County area. Grant cycles are conducted quarterly.

Three more sidewalk curbs to be modified

Sidewalk curbs at three intersections will be modified this summer to meet federal handicapped-accessibility standards, the Maquoketa City Council has decided.

The council on June 15 designated the curbs at the:

- Northeast and southeast corners of South Vermont and Eddy streets.
- Southwest and northwest corners of East Platt and Eliza streets.
- Northwest corner of South Second and James streets.

The projects are part of an agreement the city reached with state authorities to bring

all sidewalk curbs at city intersections into compliance with the federal Americans with Disabilities Act.

The locations were recommended by the city's Sidewalk Committee.

The committee also recommended the northwest corner of the intersection of North Vermont and Quarry streets.

The council decided to delay that intersection. City Manager Brian Wagner said that sidewalk curb could be done as part of a planned future improvement project on Quarry Street. The council earlier designated Quarry Street between North Vermont and North Eliza streets for a future improvement project paid for with federal street improvement funds.

That project will be done in a few years, after the city has saved enough money in its annual allotment of federal funds.

Under the sidewalk curb agreement, the council agreed to spend \$10,000 per year to make sidewalk curbs handicapped-accessible until all curbs meet the standard.

This year is the second year of the project. If funds remain in this year's allocation after the three designated intersections are complet-
