Hainstock wishes to serve another term

Bill Hainstock says he wants to serve another five years on the Jackson County Conservation Board.

Hainstock, of rural Maquoketa, told the supervisors on Dec. 8 that news reports that he did not wish to be reappointed to the board when his current term ends on Dec. 31 are incorrect.

Supervisors Chairman Jack Willey said the board had understood from Daryl Parker, conservation board executive director, that Hainstock did not wish to seek reappointment when his current five-year term expires on Dec. 31.

Board members said at their Dec. 1 meeting that they understood Hainstock planned to step down.

Hainstock gave the board a letter and said he wished to reapply for a fourth term on the board. He said he had spoken with Parker and neither he nor Parker had said he didn't wish to be reappointed.

He said he felt he had much to offer the board, particularly in the area of budgeting, with his 15 years of experience.

Hainstock also said he has served three terms on the board, not two terms as the supervisors said previously.

The supervisors agreed to consider Hainstock as a candidate when they consider making the appointment.

Supervisor Steve Flynn asked Hainstock how the conservation board budget was looking for the coming year.

Hainstock said the board has held to a no-growth budget for the past two years and has reduced the budget by \$30,000 to \$50,000.

"I feel your pain," Flynn told Hainstock, adding that other county offices are in the same situation. He said the tight budgets will have an

impact on services.

Hainstock said grants "are the one thing that keeps us going." He praised the work of Parker, conservation board naturalist Ann Burns and the other conservation board staff members.

The conservation board draws the largest number of applicants of any board or commission whose members are appointed by the supervisors.

In other business, supervisors said they expect to announce a new county zoning director at their Tuesday, Dec. 15, meeting.

Willey said the board interviewed six applicants on Dec. 7 and another candidate the next day. Two additional candidates they had planned to interview withdrew.

He said the board had several outstanding applicants for the position.

Willey said after the meeting that the board had decided on a candidate and had made a job offer.

Department of Public Health offers H1N1 vaccinations to all

The Iowa Department of Public Health (IDPH) announced that beginning Monday, Dec. 14, all Iowans will be eligible to receive an H1N1 flu vaccination.

Jackson County Public Health will hold an immunization clinic for both H1N1 influenza and seasonal influenza on Wednesday, Dec. 16. Clinic times will be from 1 to 3 p.m. and from 6 to 7 p.m. in the large conference room (former cafeteria) at Jackson County Regional Health Center.

Appointments are not necessary.

Cost of the seasonal influenza vaccine will be \$25. Those with Medicare coverage must bring their Medicare card because it will cover the cost of the vaccine.

The H1N1 vaccine is free.

"Local public health agencies have done a tremendous job during this vaccination campaign, and in getting those at highest risk vaccinated," said IDPH Director Tom Newton. "We feel confident that it is now time to expand H1N1 vaccinations to the general public."

While H1N1 vaccinations will be available to all Iowans beginning Monday, IDPH continues to encourage those at highest risk of complications to make sure they are vaccinated.

Public health officials predict that another wave of H1N1 illness will occur during the usual time Iowa sees the highest rates of influenza activity - late January and February. Thus being immunized as soon as possible will give Iowans protection against this possible third wave of illness.
