Regulations to be enforced

Jackson County officials will make a renewed effort to enforce violations of zoning and health regulations at Leisure Lake, the rural subdivision in the western part of the county.

The county Board of Supervisors and county Zoning Administrator Ben Kober discussed zoning violations with two Leisure Lake residents during a supervisors meeting on Oct. 26.

Joyce Whitney noted that Leisure Lake has dealt with problems of zoning violations and residents keeping their properties clean for years.

She said the subdivision's zoning committee has sent letters to violators and is getting results.

"But we want to know when Jackson County is going to do their fair share," Whitney asked the supervisors.

She said a mobile home recently was moved onto a lot in the development without the proper permits.

"There are several mobile homes there not in compliance, yet they are still there with people living in them," Whitney said. "When is it going to stop?"

Kober agreed that the mobile home was not set properly and does not meet the county's residential lot setback requirements.

He added that it also may not meet health regulations for water and septic tank hook-ups.

Siebert takes on role

She's been on the job for about a month and already Director Lauren Siebert has assumed the "face of the library."

"I feel I have to be the face of the library all the time, be the ambassador, engage people in conversations about the services we have now and what may jog people's imaginations about what the library can be for them in the future," Siebert said, sitting in her new office at Maquoketa Public Library.

The library's Board of Trustees hired Siebert to fill the executive director position vacated by Karen Manning, who served as library director for almost 30 years and retired last month.

Siebert is an Iowa transplant who spent her formative years growing up in Memphis. She

moved to Iowa at age 15 with her parents and attended the University of Iowa.

She earned her master's degree in library science from the University of Illinois and holds a second Master's in Middle Eastern Studies. (Interestingly, Siebert said she pursued the latter degree because she worked as a professional belly dancer and wanted to teach more about the discipline and the culture. She even studied in Egypt for a time.)

Siebert said she felt called to library sciences because of her "deep and abiding ethic of public service. I thought about where I could best serve the public and realized I felt most com-

Former resident dies in car crash

A former Maquoketa resident died last weekend in a single-vehicle accident in Wisconsin.

Adam P. Glasgow, 26, of Oregon, Wis., died early Saturday, Oct. 30, in Rutland, Wis. about 15 miles south of Madison.

The accident occurred at about 2:50 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 30, on U.S. 14 two-tenths of a mile north of the junction with Wisconsin Highway 92 in Rutland.

Elise Schaffer, spokesperson for the Dane County Sheriff's Office, said Glasgow was driving a 2007 Ford F-150 pickup truck west on 14 when the vehicle crossed the center line, ran off the left side of the highway into the west ditch and struck a power pole.

Authorities were notified by a passing motorist who observed the accident.

Glasgow was pronounced dead at the scene. He was alone in the vehicle.

Alcohol was believed to have contributed to the accident, Schaffer said. Investigation was continuing.

Glasgow resided in Maquoketa and attended Maquoketa schools until he moved with his family to Indianola in 2000.

He graduated from Indianola High School in 2003 and from the University of Northern Iowa in 2007.

He received training as a mason and was employed by J. P. Cullen Mason Division in Janesville, Wis.

Survivors include his parents, David and Karen Glasgow of Bolingbrook, Ill., and one brother, Ryan, of Ankeny.

Funeral services will be held at 11 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 3, at Sacred Heart Catholic Church in Maquoketa.

Interment will be held Wednesday at St. Mary's Cemetery in Galena, Ill.
